

Balance Your Budget and Your Time

ig Horn Rural Electric realizes how busy life can get for our members. We would like to remind you of the convenient billing and payment option we have available that may help you balance your budget and your time.

Budget Billing - Pay the same amount every month. During the

months of April, May and June you can sign up to take part in our budget billing program. The idea behind budget billing is to average your high usage bills with low usage bills. Big Horn will need at least twelve months of usage history before enrolling a member in this program.



Use Caution When Burning



that prevents moisture from entering the core of the pole and causing deterioration. If a pole is scorched or blackened. the protective coating is damaged. What might appear as just a slight burn or discoloration to the pole is, in fact, generally damage to the pole. This significantly shortens the life of a power pole and can lead to the pole becoming unstable and creating a hazard and/or an outage.


Fire damage to poles can be very expensive for Big Horn and its members.

help avoid costly repairs:

- ★ Follow all rules established
 by the fire districts in which you
 reside.
- ✓ Plan your burning before you begin. If there are power poles in the area to be burned, clean the weeds and debris from around them before you start to burn.
- ✓ If the fire does get away from you and a pole becomes engulfed in flame, immediately call the fire department and Big Horn Rural Electric.
- ✓ Caution water and electricity do not mix. When putting out a burning pole, you should not spray water close to the conductors as it may cause a short

This that time of year again when all across Big Horn's service territory, members are preparing for spring planting. Burning fields and ditches is a common method used by many of our members to clear off the debris and weeds.

Big Horn would like to remind you to please use caution when burning around poles. Power poles are treated with a protective coating Depending upon the type of pole and the hardware that it carries, several thousand dollars can be involved in replacing even one pole. In order to



It is much cheaper to prevent a pole from catching fire than to pay for a new one. Here are some suggested precautions to circuit. You or the firefighters could be in the path of that current, and serious injury or death could result.

✓ Report any fire-damaged pole to Big Horn Rural Electric immediately. Remember, not reporting a fire-damaged pole may cause a serious accident to happen later.

Important Information for Irrigators

Energy Credits

Big Horn Rural Electric Company would like to inform our members that we give rebates for electric motors that meet the required efficiency standards. You can receive up to \$16 per horsepower for an energy efficient electric motor. If the electric motor is used to replace a fossil-fueled engine or is a new installation, you can receive an additional \$1.50 per horsepower for wiring assistance. An energy credit application must be completed and an invoice or bill of sale is required. The rebate must be applied for within 180 days of installation. 2014 Irrigation Instruction Form

If you have not mailed in your 2014 Irrigation Instruction Form, Big Horn needs this information as soon as possible. If the form is not returned, we will assume that you do not want the irrigation service energized. A minimum charge will be billed on all irrigation services in place whether they are energized or not. The non-use minimum is the greater of \$19.00 per horsepower or \$200.00 which will be billed in April - you will receive this bill the first part of May. RE-MINDER - all irrigation bills are expected to be paid the month you receive the bill. Any delinquent irrigation accounts will be required to pay a deposit in order to keep the electric service.

Five Ways to Spring into Energy Efficiency

Spring marks a perfect time of year to make your home more energy efficient. Here are five quick tips that will save both energy and money:

- 1. **Seal cracks and gaps around your home.** As you put away your storm windows consider adding weather stripping around leaky doors and caulking around window frames. TogetherWeSave.com, a website sponsored by Touchstone Energy® Cooperatives, the branding program of the nation's not-for-profit, consumerowned electric co-ops, shows how easy it is to use a caulking gun to seal up leaks around vents, ductwork, and windows. A typical member of Big Horn REA can save more than \$200 annually by taking this simple step.
- 2. Change filters regularly. Change furnace and air conditioner filters monthly. Dirty filters restrict air flow and reduce the overall efficiency of your heating and cooling system by making it work harder on hot summer days.
- 3. Clean the refrigerator inside and out. Now's a good time to not only throw out that leftover fruitcake from the holidays but check the temperature settings on your refrigerator.

Ideally, a refrigerator's temperature should be between 37 and 40 degrees for maximum operating efficiency.

When it's time to replace that old refrigerator, be sure to buy one that's ENERGY STAR rated. These energy-efficient appliances can save Big Horn REA members as much as \$100 a year based on calculations from the TogetherWeSave.com.

- 4. **Think sun block.** Together-WeSave.com points out that by pulling down the shades on your windows this spring and summer, you could save about \$35 a year. Your local hardware store likely carries lots of inexpensive window coverings. Best of all, by blocking the sun, your house will stay cool and comfortable year-round.
- 5. **Enjoy spring breezes.** Use a clothesline during warmer months and let sunlight and breezes dry clothes naturally. This will reduce your electric bill by not running a dryer, and add a genuine clean scent to your family's laundry.

Tip of the Month

These days, it may be easier to trim your refrigerator's energy use than it is to trim your waistline.

Consider this energy-saving and maintenance regimen to keep your refrigerator in shape. Set the refrigerator temperature above 37 degrees Fahrenheit. Make sure door seals are in place and are snug when closed. And keep outside coils unobstructed and clean; dirty ones could overwork the unit's compressor.
